## Happy New Year!

We made it. Although there was much well-founded concern this time last year, 2023 turned out to be a year of renewal in our Council. There was significant change in the professional staff and how the Council did business. We cut expenses to a reasonable level, sold an office that no longer served our needs, paid our debts, and favorably refinanced our long-term debt. We had four, uninterrupted, good weeks of Summer Camp, a well-attended Aviation Day, Apple Harvest Camporee and numerous other outings and events that reflect well on our program. Our Order of the Arrow Lodge continued its tradition of excellence, and our Camp staff received the highest camper approval ratings in years. It was a good year for Virginia Headwaters Council.

That's the good news. The bad news is that we are not completely out of the woods yet. We recently reviewed a budget for 2024 that had us operating at a loss. We are currently taking steps to address that deficit before it even happens. That is the difference now, than before, we are identifying financial problems early and addressing them aggressively to resolve them before they adversely impact the Council and our program. But we can't do that without the support you all provide. And you all have been magnificent. A solid popcorn and peanut sales performance, along with successful special events have been crucial in keeping the Council financially stable. I believe that those programs and events will continue to grow and provide funding for our program.

I would also like thank Lowe's Corporation. Several Lowe's stores contributed a significant amount of building materials and appliances that have enabled us to remodel the Camp Administrative building and replace the roof. Moreover, we recently were

awarded a grant from a charitable trust in the amount of \$40,000 for a new roof for our Camp dining hall. Our Camp is our crown jewel, and we intend to continue a program of maintenance and improvement. That brings me to this year's Friends of Scouting Campaign.

The major component of our budget comes from Friends of Scouting. Our families that are involved in Scouting and see the benefit of the program are willing to invest and contribute towards its success. Family FOS is our cornerstone of the campaign. Each unit should plan on having a FOS presentation at an event where most of the Scouting parents will be attending. Ww need 100% participation in scheduling a FOS presentation. This year our campaign is focused on Camp Shenandoah. If you have been there, you know the magic of Camp. You can appreciate the financial needs required to perpetuate the experience for our current Scouts and those in the future. Keep that in mind when you consider your contribution. Give generously.





#### It's a New Year for all of us, Scouts and Scouters.

It's a time for reflection on all we accomplished in 2023 and our goals and aspirations for 2024. Our Council is healthier and our District is coming together. Change is inevitable, especially in Scouting. The one constant we can hang onto is Scouting's values. These do not change, even as our understanding of them evolves and matures. At the start of another year, let us all remember why we got into Scouting in the first place, and think about those values that make Scouting unique in service to Youth. The Scout Oath and Law are shining beacons that define the behavior of all good scouts and cast a light in our world, a light that overcomes the darkness and gloom that sometimes looks overpowering in a world where many people do not live by these values that define what a scout is, and ultimately, what a good man or woman should be.

Looking at each of our major areas of emphasis in our District, we have a lot we have accomplished but more that needs to be done. The most critical area remains membership. In spite of the valiant efforts of many, we ended the year a few scouts behind where we ended 2022. We lost units through consolidation or loss of sponsoring organizations. Our challenge for 2024 is to make up these losses both in units and in individual scouts, and go onto increasing our membership in all our scouting units throughout the District. We need to find new sponsoring organizations who are willing to sponsor new units, Cub packs, Scout troops, Venture crews, Explorer Posts, and maybe even a Sea Scout Ship.

Training is also an area where many have gotten position specific training this year, but many Scouters still have not completed the required training for the specific position in which they are registered. Every Scout deserves a trained leader and every volunteer deserves the opportunity to be trained. Both on line and in person training events are coming up this next year.

Finance was our weak spot at the beginning of 2023 but we ended the year on a high note. Our Council Auction

was a huge success, bringing in over \$15,000. Board and Senior Leader pledges were better than expected. Additionally, internal restructuring put us solidly in the black by end of year. An unexpected donation has provided critical, much needed funds for major improvements at Camp Shenandoah. The challenge in Finance remains Friends of Scouting. We are asking every single unit to have a 10 minute FOS Presentation this coming year. With the FOS emphasis now solidly committed to Camp Shenandoah, we can touch the families in a positive way that will ensure maximum participation and could easily double our FOS participation in 2023.

Program in our District is still looking for a chairperson but that may soon be solved. District and Council level events include Pinewood Derby, Cub Fun Day at Camp, hopefully a Merit Badge University or Rodeo, a Council (and maybe a District) Camporee, an Aviation Day, a Star Party at Camp, Scout Sunday, and Scouting for Food, just to name a few. Many Unit events are also in the works and our OA Lodge is also preparing an impressive list of activities both for service and for fun in the coming months. Ultimately Program will culminate for most units with a week at Camp, hopefully Camp Shenandoah. The reviews from last year were great, including the new contract Food Service. The staff and the Camp Program itself were second to none.





VAHC Outdoor School April 19-21, 2024

Join us at Camp Shenandoah for a weekend of training! Registration will be available soon, and we will offer the following courses:

<u>Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation.</u> BALOO is an introduction to the Cub Scout outdoor program for leaders interested in adding a camping component to their Pack activities.

Intro to Outdoor Leadership Skills. IOLS provides leaders the practical outdoor skills they need to lead Scouts in the out-of-doors and feel comfortable teaching Scouts the basic skills through the First Class rank.

Leave No Trace Level 1 Trainer. This course trains Scouts (ages 14 and older) and Scouters to serve as Leave No Trace Level 1 Instructors. Level 1 Instructors are the backbone of Scouting's outdoor ethics program.

<u>Wilderness First Aid.</u> WFA is intended for anyone planning a high adventure trek, and focuses on prevention, assessment, and treatment for an ill or injured person where definitive care by a physician and/or rapid transport is not readily available.
