This would have been a good year any time, but coming from where we were to where we are now, was nothing short of miraculous.

Camp Shenandoah Master Plan Update

Last November, a group of Scout leaders, Cub leaders, campers, former camp staff, and current camp staff was selected to begin

the work of updating the camp's master plan. The last master plan was approved by the County about 5 years ago. The special use permit expires in early April and an updated plan is needed so that our permit does not expire.

The group has met three times, the last time at a 4hour workshop to make recommendations on any changes for the physical development of the camp. Three groups developed a set of alternatives that will be taken to the Council's Executive Committee next month. The Executive Committee will decide on the plan to be taken to the County. Priorities will be decided at a later date.

The plan will be general in nature and will be taken to the Augusta County Board of Zoning Appeals on April 3. Once approved by the County, the plan will provide guidance for a preliminary engineering and architectural study to develop cost estimates. The cost estimates will guide a capital campaign to raise money for improving the camp. It is hoped that the fundraising will begin early next year.

International Scouting

Monticello District's International Scouting and Religious Emblems Committee held a pilot

program in December focused on the International Peace Light, the 1,000+ year old continuous flame originating in

Bethlehem shared person to person throughout the world. With a message of peace and friendship, the flame is transported from Bethlehem to Tel Aviv then via a special vault to Austria where



it begins traversing throughout Europe. Flights leave Austria bringing the flame to New York and then onto Argentina. From New York, the flame's trek provided Scouts the ability to spread peace within communities in 44 states, Mexico and Canada.

Our Monticello District welcomed the Peace Light around



6k miles into its journey. Several of our Troops and Packs participated in our pilot program to gauge community interest and feasibility plan for a larger event in 2024. We are excited to report an overwhelming success!

- 5th graders you've been working with AOLs to help them crossover to a Troop, but what about kids who weren't Cub Scouts? Ten-yearolds in 5th Grade can join a Troop even if they weren't in Cub Scouts on March 1st. Sell the adventure!
- 3. Pre-K [rising kindergarteners] parents are anxious and eager to meet other families. You can begin registering Lions [online] as soon as they turn 5, or after June 1 (they become kindergarteners). Then they can join for some family fun at Camp Shenandoah June 16-18!
- Adults Do you have AOL parents active in a Pack? Ask them to transfer (or multiple register) by "joining" your unit at beascout.org!
